


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Message from the Chairman



I remember Victory Park

The Lissoos family moved into Victory Park 37 years ago. We chose this suburb because of the Jewish day school presence and a Shul congregation.

Initially shul services were held in the Primary school hall – women on the left of the hall and men on the right with a substantial aisle between.

Discussions at Shul committee meetings always centered on the building of a shul. If one goes to the minutes of these meetings there was always this discussion. Eventually Collie Wainer, a more than well known property landlord, took the bull by the horns and got things going in the building of our present shul. He was ably assisted in fund raising by Harry Bloom, Monty Kobrin, David Serebro and Seymour Chertkow.

Eventually enough money was raised. Negotiations with the South African Jewish Board of Education allowed us to build our Shul on the King David High School property.

Ruth Gimpel (now Lazarus) headed the Ladies committee and with her usual skill was responsible for the delicious catering of all the shul functions.

Rael, our son, was one of the first boys to have his barmitzvah at the shul. He was also one of the first to conduct the Friday night service and to read the whole sedra – i.e. Layening all the aliyahs.

After much controversy, good sense finally prevailed and the King David schoolgirls started having their Batmitzvahs at the shul. Dolly Levin scripted and trained the girls for what was always a moving and impressive ceremony. Rabbi Baumgarten's address to the girls was always inspiring.

Three of the Lissoos girls had their batmitzvahs here. On one occasion our shul was not big enough and the batmitvahs were held in the Emmarentia Shul. Thus Phili Lissoos had her batmitzvah in Emmarentia.



The school was to use the Shul for daily prayers.

The Shul Rabbi, if and when appointed, was to be involved on the school campus. Ivan Ziskind, who had just designed the Yeshiva College shul was appointed architect. We got our new shul!!!

The Victory Park Hebrew congregation has been the central focus of religious activities in this area and of communal life. The shul has played a very important part in our lives



All the residents of the Selwyn Segal join me in wishing you every success on the occasion of your 40th anniversary celebrations and may the congregation go from strength to strength.



The silence here is such as you only hear in the deep country-side, birds chirping, frogs leaping in the water, buck and the like sipping gently at the waterhole. Random sightings of lion, elephants and many other of the beasts of creation.

Much like that January day in 1966 when we moved into our newly completed house in Victory Park. A wooded setting, few houses, but teeming with the atmosphere of things to come.

Next door, a celebration in progress marking the arrival of a new baby, representing the spirit of a young suburb, vital and energetic, bound to grow to maturity.

Of course, Victory Park could not remain pastoral and undeveloped with sand roads, cows grazing in the fields and trees everywhere. Houses were being built all over and in the nature of things Jewish, the time came to make provision for this new suburb's spiritual development.

A small group of the early residents, including Dave Serebro, Seymour Chertkow, Erwin Chernin, Harold Smith, Arnie Valkin, Des Novick and yours truly, set about the task of starting a Shul.

Sadly, most of those involved are no longer members of the Shul and even more sadly, some have passed on. However, we should all remember them with appreciation for their efforts. We canvassed the residents and approached all newcomers to the suburb. Development of houses was such that there was a constant influx of new residents. Many belonged to other and established Shuls and we had to show that we could meet expectations.

Eventually, in 1967, we commenced Friday night services in the foyer of, and subsequently inside, the Primary School Hall. We had begged and borrowed Sifreh Torahs, had an Oren Kodesh made, used the schools' chairs in rows facing each other for the men and the ladies and we were "in business".

Friday night services were initially conducted by various members who, although not trained, were able to do so. In order to grow and increase our offering as a community shul, we had to increase the services to include Shabbat morning and festival services and everything that went along with that. We soon employed trained and skilled persons to lead the services and to attend to the spiritual needs of the congregants. We had successes and failures amongst these. I think of Philip Heilbron who was an outstanding Chazan and, on the other side of the coin, a certain person, employed part time for Friday night and Shabbat services only, who was a huge disappointment.

All the while we were using the Primary School Hall for services, having to set up and take down each week and Yomtov. The Committee, comprising mainly the original founding group plus a number of notable, hard working and enthusiastic people were well aware that we could not continue in temporary premises and began moves to secure a permanent home for the Congregation.

It made sense to remain within the campus of the King David Schools. The High School was still very much in a growth phase. A bequest from the Hurwitz Family, endowing a hall for the High School served as a catalyst to combine the development of a new school hall with a synagogue, where some synergy of facilities could be enjoyed. A proper Shul would also create a venue for the daily morning services attended by the pupils.

A serious fund raising campaign was undertaken and various people, then on the Committee worked extremely hard to raise the funds necessary to get going. Amongst these, the late Harry Bloom, was a tireless worker.

What had to be done, was done. The Shul was built, clergy were appointed and this spanking new facility was opened by the then Chief Rabbi, Rabbi Bernard Casper, amid celebrations and great joy on 7 August 1977.

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My name is Hymie Altman. For my sins I am a Quantity Surveyor (and a jolly good one too!!) I was privileged to have been appointed by the then august and knowledgeable specially constituted "Body of Balebattim" which was entrusted by the Victory Park and Outlying Districts Hebrew Congregation to act on it's behalf as a Caretaker Building Committee.

Why am I telling you all this?

Well, I was recently asked by one of your present day Shul Committee Members whether I was involved in the construction of the Shul? Whether I knew of or could remember anything humorous or something of interest that could be shared with the Community? My response was immediately in the affirmative!!!

I had always dreamed of one day telling someone/anyone/everyone about a most unusual type of incident that happened at one of our weekly site meetings...it certainly was unusual, and being personally involved, it was frightening!! Everyone who was (privileged enough to be) present at this particular site meeting included, inter alia, members representing the Client, Architects, Structural Engineers, Electrical Consultants, Quantity Surveyors, Main Building Contractors, Sub Contractors and other interested parties, were shocked at what they witnessed!!!

At this stage a bit of background: Remember that any building contract doesn't just happen!

Many months, if not years, of planning, hard work, sweat and tears, snot en trane, re-planning, revamping, pricing, adjusting, negotiating, forwards and backwards, until a fair and viable contract is eventually arrived at and signed and sealed. By the time construction is underway the whole of the "building team" becomes (or should become) a cohesive integrated unit and everyone knows (or should know) precisely what is required to successfully and amicably conclude the Contract.

Another bit of background: Some significant trivia relevant to this episode regarding its main players:

Firstly, yours truly: I am not (nor was I then) one of the smallest guys around....95 to 100kg and 1,82 m tall makes me no small baby!!

Secondly, our Main Contractors: Messrs. 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
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Victory Park Shul Anniversary Tribute February 2008

It is now almost a quarter of a century since I first set foot in the Victory Park Shul. It was here that I celebrated my barmitvah, a very nervous young boy, in 1987, and it was here that I began my spiritual journey that would eventually lead me to the rabbinate.

My memory of the shul is by and large connected to several families, all of whom had a profound influence on my life.

Rabbi Yossi and Liebe Baumgaten opened their home to me and I soon became a regular visitor and a close friend of Mordechai and Shalom DovBer. Meals at the Baumgartens were legendary-great food (even the 'cardboard' shmurah matzah on Pesach was somewhat of a delicacy!) interesting conversation and a steady stream of guests from across the religious spectrum. But their involvement did not end there. Every Thursday night, at the behest of Mordechai, I would join a small group of young men from the neighborhood on the long trek to the Torah Academy School in Oaklands where we enjoyed the weekly mishmar learning prgramme. This in turn led to many Shabbatonim on 'the other side of town', most of which were run by the spirited and lively Lubavitcher bochrim from America. Rabbi Baumgarten was always on hand to assist me and many others in the performance of mitzvot through the Victory Park mitzvah fund and he often encouraged me to deliver short divrei Torah at Seudah shlishit and at other times. I now have my own Rabbi's Discretionary Fund, which, thank G-d, has assisted many congregants to lead a better Jewish life.

David and Renee Shaw were another couple that contributed to the spiritual growth of many young men and women in the community. One could always find a large group of high school students at the Shaw apartment on Shabbat afternoons where we ate, sang and learned in a relaxed and humorous atmosphere. David personally saw to arranging learning programmes for the youth of our shul and it was at his insistence that several of us would go to the Keter Torah community of Rabbi David Lapin every Sunday morning for classes in Talmud, Mussar and Chumash. Even after they left Victory Park, I maintained a strong connection with the Shaws and I would often visit their home, first in Sydenham and later in Sandton, before they emmigrated to Australia shortly after I was married in 1998.

The long Shabbat afternoons at Victory Park offered the 'Shabbos gang' an opportunity to spend time together, socializing, learning and enjoying good food. The Victory Park Shabbos gang of the 80's consisted of, amongst others, Michael and Daniel Gimpel, Adam Galgut, Maurice Aron, Jonathan and Saul Bloom, the late Marc Aarons, of blessed memory, Michael, Larry and Brandon Raff and David Frankel. Many of these young men have gone on to study at yeshiva, marry and produce wonderful observant families in South Africa, Israel, America and elsewhere.

These young men were frequent guests of Ruth and the late Willie Gimpel, at whose home one could sample Ruth's culinary delights, talk philosophy with the older Gimpel boys, Jonathan and David, and even take a nap after lunch. Another favourite location was the home of Rhona and the late Harry Bloom, where the gang delighted in snooker, ping-pong, soccer and tennis. These activities made it possible for many to keep Shabbos, which at their own home may have been too lengthy and lonely to deal with.

Of course, the Victory Park shul was renowned for its many colorful characters. Remember Irwin Gutkin's pesukei d'zimra, recited at a world-record speed of 15 minutes every Shabbat? After all a 'time is a time', as the shul motto attested to. What about the snuffboxes passed around by the old timers at the back of the shul on Shabbat mornings? And who could forget Bulke (and I don't mean the pastries served at the brochah!) or the controversial ice machine that was always a subject of religious debate!

Victory park shul was a family, a home, and a place where you could find your own niche, whether it was a quiet spot to daven, a good whiskey with friends or a challenging shiur on the Parsha.

I will always recall my years at the shul with fondness and joy and I wish the community hatzlacha rabbah for the future.

Rabbi Baumgarten was the first to influence me, while I was learning my Bar Mitzvah parsha, by saying in order to learn with him, I had to attend shul for the whole year prior to my Barmitzvah. This I did and started coming to shul regularly. Further he and Lieba often invited me over for Shabbes lunch. I realized that Chalah and Cholent are nothing to be sneezed at. Simultaneously I was becoming good and true friends with some other "regulars" my age, While some people may think Shabbes is a drag, for me it was the highlight of my week. Always great food and great company. We used to go in packs from one house to the next, like a plague of locusts devouring all the great food put in front of us. Thank you to all the mothers who used to always manage to provide more food than we could eat - very impressive. There were some Youth Directors who went on to great things who also had an influence on my group,

"Always try help the community" "Some one has to put the siddurim away"" and to be grateful to the ladies and men who work so hard, for the Shul for nothing more than a complaint about how things could be done in a better way. The above and many more midot (characteristics) are what made and make the Victory Park congregation so special. 

Our request was granted and the Victory Park Congregation came into being. We now had to find a home for our minyan and what better place could there be than the Primary School hall as the High School did not have a hall at the time. Every Friday afternoon you would find a group of young men setting up the hall for the Shabbat. The community prospered and grew.

Eventually Rabbi Phillip Heilbrunn became our Spiritual Leader. We had arrived.

As the community grew our beautiful Shul was built. It became a place of worship which was used every day by the pupils attending the high school.

The present leaders of the community have a very different environment to deal with. Emigration and demographic changes within the community have created challenges not seen previously. I wish them well in their endeavours and pray that our Community grows from strength to strength.

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Congratulating Victory Park Shul on their 40th Anniversary.

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Excerpts from the late CHIEF RABBI CASPER'S ADDRESS AT THE OPENING OF THE VICTORY PARK SHUL - 1967

We are the generation of survivors. We are the generation who have seen so much destruction of Jewish values, of centres of Torah, centres of Jewish idealism and life, and therefore it is heartwarming for us to be able from time to time to see a sort of a reawakening , a rebirth, a resurgence of Jewish activity, of Jewish belief, of Jewish practice in our parts of the world .

A synagogue is for us a symbol of human values, of humanity itself.

A few years ago, at the time of the Munich massacre of Jewish athletes I referred to terrorist activity as a cancer which, unless uprooted by international determination will inevitably spread so that eventually no one will be safe anywhere. Its perpetrators have apparently lost all sense of the value of human life. We plead with the International community. Specially, may I say with world religious bodies to take firm steps to control this anarchy, to prevent further bloodshed. Stop the dangerous erosion of human values.

Human values. That I suppose is what our celebration here this afternoon is all about. This particular synagogue has got some special features. I will not discuss its architectural features - others perhaps are more competent to judge that. The feature which I am referring to particularly is that this is a synagogue which is linked with a school. If I may say so, I think it grew out of the school. First there was learning. First there was a place for children. First there was a place for Torah, and from this gradually a community grew, and grew, until eventually this particular synagogue has come about in such a way that it will have a golden, glorious opportunity of bringing to bear its influence upon hundreds of our children day by day. That those children will be able not merely to see an edifice from the outside, but to come into it constantly every day. To feel its warmth, to feel its guidance, to feel its Jewish inspiration.

There is another lesson, which I think has to be learnt from it, and that is, what we might call the sense of community. A sense of mutual responsibility - the one for another. We need to be with others in a community so that we should be able to demonstrate the relationship, the proper relationship, between one man and another. That is why we say our prayers always in a minyan , so that a man should know that he has to link himself with others in the community, so that there is nothing selfish about his prayers. He prays not merely for himself but for others, for all those round about him. A sense of responsibility is there for us to learn from page after page of our sacred teachings.

Every single one of us must see himself as though he is facing the whole world and every single person has to realize that he has it in his power to bring a blessing or a curse to the whole of the world.

And there is another thought, in this same connection, that I must leave with you. It's important that every individual should be aware of the potential which is his. The power which is in his hands. When you know such a thing, when you have this awareness of the potential of your place in the world, of your place in life, of the opportunities that are before you, of what you can achieve and what you should do when you are aware of these things, then the possibilities that are before you are almost limitless.
